
When can we meet again?

Dear Church family

I trust you are all keeping well, and coping with the situation we find ourselves in. In my readings and conversations throughout this pandemic one word keeps appearing – that is the word HOPE. At the beginning of lockdown I placed this word in the window in the Shrubsole room overlooking the car park praying that it would bring Hope to all who looked up and saw it. Hope in our language can be rather abstract but, Hope in Hebrew provides a strong image. The image of a cord or rope, that cannot only be seen with our eyes, but is something to grasp on to with our hands - something that is real enough to cling to. However for us who are used to the hurly burly life there is a downside - Hope is always rooted in waiting. I was intrigued by a suggestion in a book I was reading – the concept of being 'prisoners of Hope'. I wondered what does it mean to be a prisoner of Hope? A prison, holds you in on all sides and contains you, so being a prisoner of Hope then must mean you are surrounded and protected. Are we then prisoners of Hope? Psalm 139:5 says 'you hem me in, behind and before and lay your hand on me' The Message version reads 'I look behind me and you're there then up ahead and you're there also, too – your reassuring presence, coming and going'. I believe we are surrounded and protected by our unshakeable trust in God – his promises and his infinite love for each and every one of us. As long as we have God we have Hope a bright hope for tomorrow as the hymnist put it.

As it is written in Hebrews 6:18b;19 we who have taken refuge might be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us. We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul. A gift from our Lord for our taking.

But for now we have to wait. Now is not the time.

In my reading today:'So then, have your minds ready for action. Keep alert and set your hope completely on the blessing which will be given to you when Jesus Christ is revealed.' 1Peter 1:13 and 'It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set' Acts 1:7a

So it is in our situation too. We have to stay Alert and ready for action for when the time comes. We do not know when that time will be, but we are blessed prisoners of Hope, because we can cling on to our Heavenly Father who is in this with us. The Lord will lead us out when the time is right.

In the mean time, hang on tight to Him, whose love for you is greater than you can imagine. Stay in touch with each other, pray that the right time will come soon, and until we meet again May God Bless You.
