Today's Gospel Reading: Matthew 10.40-42

Time to Reflect

Today's short snippet from Matthew closes the block of Jesus' teaching on mission in Matthew's gospel. Giving the authority to preach God's Kingdom, to heal the sick and to cast out demons, the disciples are about to take the good news of Jesus' love into the wider world.

To wrap up his teaching, Jesus reminds them that as his followers, they are representing him and the one who sent him, God the Father. For those who receive and accept them, it would be as if they are welcoming Jesus himself into their homes.

I wonder, when someone knocks at your door now, what sort of a welcome will you offer? If the welcome is given on the basis that the one being received is a prophet or a righteous person according to the scripture, then the host might expect a reward. I wonder what kind of reward you might expect when you open the door?

The notion of welcome and hospitality in the Middle East is of high importance. The host-

guest relationship is conventional as it forms a substantial basis for support in the life of the whole community. Especially, since the weather is hot and people have to use water wells to obtain fresh water, so giving a cup of cold water to someone who knocks at your door is a very common thing. It would be like keeping a two meters distance these days!

This smallest act of charity is commonly practiced culturally regardless of one's status: prophet, righteous person or the little ones.

I believe the phrase "little ones" refers to all those disciples of Jesus who by themselves receiving the living water find themselves serving others. For each act of service is as though offered to God and will receive its reward.

Just as Jesus comes not to be served but to serve and to give His life as a ransom for many (Matt 20:28, Mark 10:45), so too are His disciple transformed to be part of the solution by serving others to witness Jesus' love and salvation to the wider world.

And all of God's servants will be rewarded, even a person who in the name of a disciple gives a cup of cold water to one of God's "little ones" - the smallest act of hospitality and courtesy possible. That being so, it creates a ripple effect of Jesus' love to restore this broken world in the most needed time.

Like the disciples, our lives should conform to the image of the Son Jesus and reflect his generous love to others. Let's give a cup of refreshing water to those who knock on your door and keep passing on this welcoming hospitality.
