Call to worship/Coronation prayer

Dear friends, we have come together in the name of Christ to offer our praise and thanksgiving, to seek forgiveness of our sins, to hear and receive God's holy word, and to pray for the needs of the world.

Breathing in God's Spirit; responding to God's Call

Today is Vocation Sunday in the Methodist Church –

The Sunday when we think about how God calls each of us --

Calls us to particular tasks at particular times for particular reasons – We hear in scripture about God calling Moses and Aaron and Joshua

to lead the Hebrew people out of slavery and into the Promised Land;

God calling Isaiah and Jeremiah and Jonah and Elijah to be prophets

To warn and encourage people to change their ways;

God calling Deborah and Samson and Eli to be judges for their people's disputes; God calling Mary to bear the Messiah

Jesus calling John and James and Matthew and Thomas to be his disciples

And the blind and the lame and the outcastes to follow him.

We know from the scriptures that God continues calls us to different tasks:

Some to be teachers or writers,

some to be mothers or fathers or godparents

Some to be doctors or teachers or ambulance drivers,

Some to be church treasurers, some to be medical researchers,

Some to be flower arrangers, some to be computer experts,

Some to be preachers or church leaders,

others to take up the collection and wash up after the Coffee Morning, Some to be graphic designers, or newspaper editors,

Some to drive buses or rubbish trucks or milk floats...

And on this Coronation weekend, we remember that occasionally God calls someone to be king...

It's easy enough to get swept up in the pomp and circumstance of the occasion

And forget that 'King' isn't the only important job around!

God has work for all of us to do.

+As the Covenant Service reminds, some of the tasks to which God calls us are "easy,

And others are difficult, Some bring honour, others bring reproach..."

And though not many of us receive 'chrism oil' when we take on a new responsibility,

Or have a national holiday declared

Or ride to our new position in a chariot

Or have music composed in our honour

Or concepts celebrating our appointment...

God still has work to be done, and God still calls God's people to be building up God's kingdom Of justice and joy and peace.

The Covenant service also reminds us that God gives us the power to do Whatever God calls us to do...

And that whatever power we're given to fulfil God's calling

also brings responsibility to use that power for the good of others.

So it's not our place to covet the power or prestige of others

But to recognise and use the power we have for the common good

And to keep encouraging others to use whatever powers they have for the common good.

The passage from Ephesians that I used as a prayer a few moments ago Speaks to this recognition of power

And it frames it in terms of the power of God's Spirit, God's love within us, Spurring us on – empowering us, in-spiring us...

That word 'in-spire' is essential here –

The '-spire' part is about Spirit, about breath, about the power of the Spirit. We often use a similar word, 'enthuse', which is also about God's spirit -The '-thuse' or 'theos' of God coming within us. Both these words point to our power ultimately coming from God -Who is ever-so-eager to fill us with power when we ask. I have a friend who suffers from mental illness. She's often afraid to get out of bed in the morning. She gets panic attacks when she tries to take a walk around the neighbourhood. She's always tired, but she can't sleep at night – or in the day. I keep telling her to take deep breaths. 'Keep breathing,' I hear myself saying. And sometimes when I hear myself saying that, I think: is this just what any secular counsellor would say? Where is God in this? And then I remember again that 'breath' and 'Spirit' are all the same word in Hebrew And in Greek – So a physical, practical way of being 'inspired' or 'enthused' Can be as simple as taking a deep breath – Especially if that act of taking a breath reminds us Of the power God offers us – to come and cleanse and empower. A few weeks ago we had another scripture about God's Spirit coming to empower... The 'Dry Bones' scripture of Ezekiel -- like the Ephesians scripture --Reminds us that if we're just going through the motions of doing, But have no 'breath', no 'Spirit' within us, Then we have no life in us. Indeed, when we check to see if a person is alive We check first to see if they're still breathing. The breath, the Spirit within us, is what keeps us alive and functioning as spiritual beings. Liturgically, we're in the part of the Church Year between Easter and Pentecost -Coming up to what's known as Ascension Day, When Jesus's body ascended into heaven, but his Spirit stayed with us ... To enable us to do the things that he had been doing... John 14:12 says: "Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father." In this verse, Jesus says he is 'going to the Father', but he promises that his Spirit will be with us and within us... God's Spirit within each of us to do the things God needs us to do To build up God's Kingdom -To take care of the vulnerable, to remind all that they are loved, That God has work for all of us to do. Over this weekend, many of us have witnessed Charles' coronation And the prayers for God's Spirit to be within him as he leads our nation. I imagine that, though in many ways he's prepared for this all his life, It must still feel rather overwhelming at the moment. I wonder if Charles – or a close advisor – was reminding him to 'keep breathing'...

Keep remembering that he's not on his own in this. God does not leave any of us alone in this. God continually offers to give us God's Spirit That will give life and breath to all we do. Especially when we do it in God's name. That's important to remember when we consider another scripture passage chosen for today: "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light." (1 Peter 2) As I mentioned earlier, we're not all called to be King -But God invites all of us to be part of God's 'royal priesthood' called to be active in God's work, filled with God's Spirit Inspired to continue the work that Jesus started while he was bodily present with us Now possible in an even greater way Because God's Spirit is not confined to one person But can and will fill us all to do the work Jesus did... We've looked at the words 'inspire' and 'enthuse', And now there's still another word to explore: 'Vocation' comes from the Latin word 'vocare', to call, and means the work a person is called to by God. We often think of 'vocation' within the church as going for ordination – But in truth, God needs many different kinds of work done -Just as God doesn't call everyone to be a king, We also couldn't function very well if everyone were a minister! This is the time of year when each of our circuit lay employees has an Annual Review – And one of the areas we explore is their 'vocation' -Their calling to be working for God's kingdom as a Lay Worker -Which means everything from doing the circuit bookkeeping To setting up spreadsheets for the Preaching Plan To negotiating with building contractors Can be part of building up God's Kingdom! When we think about God's calling on this Coronation weekend, I reflect that Charles has known for many decades now What his eventual 'calling' would be -And he's had plenty of time to prepare for that! But in the waiting time, he also had other 'callings' to address -Using whatever resources, whatever gifts he had... God has called me several times in my life to do different things -I've shared with you before that God called me to do various studies To marry my husband and then to travel with him to work in India. God called me to be a mother to a variety of children -Some coming from my womb and some from my heart – To some I was a teacher, to others their pastor or minister or youth leader, To some I am their grandmother... God called me to be a music teacher for many years And then God called me to be a minister. And now I find my vocation, my calling, changed again as I am a superintendent. I often hear other superintendents - even other ministers-

Who find themselves burdened with endless administrative responsibilities And tasks they're rather not do: "God didn't call me to this." That might be true, but more honestly, God sometimes calls us To things we'd rather not do. And rather than putting restrictions around what we consider to be God's calling, Perhaps it's truer to recognise that Jesus calls us to follow him -And that following might just take us to things we don't want to do – Perhaps even be crucified. But we've just celebrated Easter recently, And we know that even crucifixion is not the end. God's Spirit keeps popping back up – like the proverbial Jack-in-the-box Who can never stay confined long under the lid – Whenever the crank on the side of the box is turned And the music begins, God's Spirit is alive again! A more accurate test of our vocation is to recognise That God most often calls us to the place where our gifts and talents and experience Match up with 'the world's greatest need.' Recognising that 'world's greatest need' is going to be different for each of us -Because we all view the world in different ways, So we each see a different part of the world's need. Perhaps where we can help each other is recognising in each other The gifts that each has received that the world needs. And how best those gifts can be used... Through the years, I've had the privilege of walking alongside several people Who have felt called to ordained or lay ministry within the Church. I remember my own call to ministry – For me, it came during a worship service at an Annual Conference in Florida, When a Korean Bishop said something (I don't remember exactly what it was!) That spoke directly to me. Though I'd heard good and great sermons for years, Suddenly I heard God calling ME to be a minister. That call was surprising enough that I needed a while to process what I was hearing: Was God actually calling me? To what kind of ministry? When I shared my sense of call with some other ministers (all males at that time!) They mostly said: "When I felt the call, I dropped everything and went for training!" I remember thinking at the time: yes, but you had a wife, And I have a lovely husband, but I also have four children And a full-time job which I love, and I live on the top of a mountain in S India Where there is no formal training for ministry available. In fact, it took me 11 years from that call to be fully ordained, It wasn't something that happened overnight Like having a fairy godmother wave a wand over me. I learned that sometimes God's call is merely a prod to follow a different path Rather than jump right into a destination. Indeed, it is often the journey that prepares us for our call.

(And as we're thinking about King Charles today, We can certainly point out that he's been on a long journey!)
I've also 'travelled with' others who have felt they've been called,
But when they got to the Candidates' Committee,
They found their call was challenged –
Sometimes even rejected.
And they were quite amazed, even devastated!
It's easy in such a case to think that those challenging a call are opposed to God's calling But I've learned that the group's responsibility was to 'test' that call –
To determine if it indeed was how it was being heard.
And what God was actually calling that person to do and bed.
Even in my own case, I understood my original call to be a minister
Was to be stationed in Florida, where I had grown up.
But God had other ideas.
And every time I went to the Candidates' Committee in Florida
I felt, this is not where I'm supposed to be,
But I don't know where I'm supposed to be,
So I'll keep coming here till I hear otherwise.
And then, eventually, God called me to come to England
And that's where God has been using me for the past 22 years.
I wonder what God is calling you to do and be?
I wonder what use God has of your particular gifts and talents and experiences?
I know for a fact that God usually doesn't just call once
And then leave everything as it is.
God continually calls. And keeps calling.
God continually promises to inspire.
God keeps offering to breathe God's Spirit into us.
For the good of each of us
For the good of all of us.
So keep breathing.
Keep inhaling God's Spirit.
Keep listening for what God's world needs
And what skills and gifts God has equipped you with
That will help to meet that particular need.
Keep listening and watching and noticing and breathing in God's Spirit.
God isn't finished with any of us yet. Amen.
