always making himself available to talk through issues and give support, either by phone or email or face-to-face visits – and often several times a week! Whatever challenges there were to face, we were able to face them together, and Tony was always available to help me gain a wider perspective of how God was leading us. I shall miss him immensely! We wish Tony well as he moves to Burnley this summer to take up new challenges in ministry.

I have greatly appreciated having Elaine as a colleague as well, especially as she's been willing to attend many of our circuit ministerial and staff meetings, even though she could – as an Anglican – claim she was too busy with other responsibilities. Elaine has contributed thoughtfully to our situations, often reflecting to us how our Methodist efforts appear to Anglican eyes. That is an important gift of ecumenical work! At the same time, Elaine has been 'one of us,' sharing herself and her resources

generously. We will miss Elaine as she retires and moves out of our area.

In this edition of *Grapevine*, we have tributes to them both, along with two contributions to our request for readers to tell us their Favourite Hymn. It's interesting that one of those is 'One More Step Along the World I Go', which Sydney Carter wrote for one of his children who was anxious about starting Year Two at school. 
# Thank you, Tony, and farewell!

Eleven years ago we were preparing for the coming together of four circuits into one, and for the inauguration of the North Kent Methodist Circuit. It was a time for meeting many new people from across our area, and I will never forget the first time I met the Revd Tony Graff, I had somehow found myself in the role of Circuit Steward in the new Circuit Leadership Team, with the particular brief of supporting Tony in Mission and Ministry - or Ministry and Mission, we never could remember which. I must admit I was terrified by the responsibility and at the task, but Tony quickly put me at ease and I soon discovered what a joy it was to work with him.

Tony was to give me many challenges, the first of which was to be part of a team planning the Inauguration Service for the North Kent Circuit. For this service Tony wrote a prayer likening our journey from four circuits into one as a voyage across the waters, very appropriate as the service was held in the Dockyard Church. The prayer begins:

We will step out on to the waters, with all familiar footholds gone. We will launch out on to the seas, with God our only compass to guide us home. Our voyage will take us through strong winds and stormy waves. But we will look to Jesus, who holds us when we falter, and will not let us fall.





Perhaps the biggest challenge Tony presented to me was to be a tutor in the pilot scheme of Worship: Leading and Preaching, the new training for Local Preachers. He knew I was interested in finding an update for the old Faith and Worship course, but W:L&P turned out to be a huge learning curve for all of us - students, mentors and tutors as well as supporting ministers. I would never have managed this without the support of Tony, who managed to persuade me that I did have the skills and ability to do it! Another challenge was when we were looking for a more up-to-date Worship Leaders course, and Leading Contemporary Worship was planned out. Tony encouraged this to become a Circuit-wide course and, with the support of already accredited Preachers and Worship Leaders, several new Worship Leaders were trained.

Many of us will remember Tony's services, especially his sermons, always without notes, sometimes based around a single word such as "abide", but usually there was a story. Tony will always be for me the great story-teller. Many of us have loved his retelling of Bible stories, bringing people and their situations to life. In his short time with us in Larkfield he was always so willing to be our story-teller at Messy Church. The

parents would sit quietly spell-bound, while some of the little ones (we had some naughty and noisy ones at that time) would carry on with their play, and Tony would just carry on with the story. The parents really loved his stories!

Stationing has been a very important part of Tony's role while he has been with us, and it has been good to support him as he is always so welcoming and able to put visiting potential new ministers and their families at their ease. He himself has proved immensely flexible and willing to move to the parts of the circuit where he has been needed, firstly many years in Sittingbourne, then a short stay in Larkfield before going to Gravesend where he has been able to offer a much-needed sense of stability for some years. Sadly, at least for us, stationing is taking Tony far away to pastures new, and I know he will bless the people of Burnley, as he has blessed us in North Kent for many years, with his interest in each individual, his kindness, calmness and compassion.

I will leave you with the last words from Tony's prayer at the Inauguration service, which sum up his faith, and his ministry:

And so our Captain calls
"All hands on deck,"
and we give ourselves to share his work.
With his help,
We will worship and pray;
We will learn and care;
We will be good neighbours to
those in need
and challenge injustice;
We will make disciples for Jesus Christ.
We will share God's mission of love
as he brings us with the whole creation
to his heavenly kingdom.
To God we give our thanks and praise

Thank you, Tony, for all you have given to each of us and to the North Kent Methodist Circuit.

# Farewell and thanks to Elaine

Whenever a minister retires or "sits down", to borrow the Methodist term, it is tempting to view their ministry in terms of numbers: years of service; baptisms, weddings and funerals; committee meetings chaired at various levels; school assemblies delivered: sermons written and pastoral visits undertaken. We might add-in the numbers of people supervised, those trained and sent forth into ministry, or encouraged along the path to confirmation. However, Christian ministry cannot be measured by such things.

The Reverend Elaine Cranmer joined the Parish and Local Ecumenical Partnership of Holy Trinity South Chatham as Team Rector on 4 February 2014. For those counting, that was over eight years ago. But these eight years are only the most recent stretch of Elaine's forty plus years of service to the Church, first as a Lay Reader licensed in Durham Diocese in 1981, and then from 2000 onwards as a full-time ordained Minister in Southwark and Rochester. That's a lot of leadership, service and pastoral care!

In South Chatham as Team Rector, Elaine's service has included a lot of behind the scenes administration –

returns to the Circuit, Diocese and Local Authorities - the preparation and cooking of meals (St David's Lunch Club), and the setting-up of tables and chairs – a major feature of any parish where the buildings are used as much by the local community as the worshipping congregation. Highlights of Elaine's time in South Chatham also include the training of two curates, both of whom through their own unique gifts have brought life to the parish; a stint as Chaplain to the Mayor of Medway and a three month sabbatical in 2018. Elaine was instrumental in the installation of new windows at St William's, a project which was on the back-burner for what seems like an age, and as a Parish we hosted a wonderful Deanery Confirmation service attended by the Reverend Tony Graff, which saw a number of candidates confirmed from all three churches in the LEP. But again. we are beginning to talk about numbers and measurables!

Over and above the year on year task of overseeing the pattern of worship in the parish and many hospitality events from Messy Church to the Blue Bell Hill Summer Fayre at St Alban's, Elaine has shared something far more important. As St Paul writes in his first letter to the Thessalonian church, Elaine has shared with us not only the Gospel of God but



her very self (1 Thessalonians 2:7-9). As colleagues in ministry, it has been a privilege to pray with, and learn from Elaine through her reflective leadership, spirituality and discipleship. On more than one occasion Elaine has drawn our attention to the Rule of St Benedict, a tradition she values highly, especially the themes of transformation (conversion), obedience, stability (which one might wrap-up in the word faithfulness), and hospitality. Each of these values, Elaine has modelled throughout her time with us.

Thank you, Elaine, for the gifts you have shared and for your leadership over the past eight years. We wish you well in your retirement. May you now enjoy even more hours spent behind a camera as well as time with your family both in the south-east and north-west of England. We will be praying for you as you continue to walk with Christ in all that lies ahead.

(As one Church Warden recently remarked, Elaine does not appear in many Parish photographs because she is usually the one taking them! But we found these... "one is a cracker!")

#### StF 357 'JESUS – the name high over all' Charles Wesley (1707 – 1788)

As a young person I attended Luton Road Methodist Church where one of the opportunities given to us was to join a Mission Band, sharing in leading worship. I was 16 when I became a member of the Mission Band and it was there that I found my call to preach. So I set out to prepare for my Local Preacher Examinations with one subject a year to study Old Testament, New Testament and Christian Doctrine followed by written examinations.

On 2 June 1958, having been 'On Trial' for several years, I was accepted by the Chatham Garrison and Naval Port Mission Circuit on behalf of the Methodist Church as a Fully Accredited Methodist Local Preacher.

I have had the privilege of preaching for 63 years, not only in the Circuit where I have resided but also in many churches with the Connexion.

My call to preach is as real today as it was when I was 16.

Over the years there have been many new and modern hymns written but I still turn to Charles Wesley for my favourite hymn which means everything to me: 'JESUS - the name high over all'.

What is the task of the preacher? Verses 5 and 6 of this hymn sum it all up for me and the words are really relevant.

'Tis all my business here below To cry 'Behold the Lamb!'

'Preach him to all' – and that is what I have tried to do over these past 60 years.

set up as many groups as she could to keep in touch with the young people.

We wish Helen every success in her new role in Birmingham and will miss her smile and her bouncy personality around the church at Gillingham.

We had so much fun and lots of people seemed to enjoy watching them - we even have our own YouTube channel! Sorry, we have destroyed all the outtakes but we had a good laugh over them. It has been a good journey - Helen has been great, sharing her sense of fun and her faith with the young people, listening to them and encouraging them to be their best selves and to know the love of God. There is so much more to say – we are sad that she is leaving but happy for her in her new life in Birmingham.
