

As I write this slightly later in the month than planned two things have recently been spoken about in different church groups: Daniel in the fiery furnace and Guy Fawkes.

In certain parts of the world there all still highly active wars going on where it is not safe to live. In front of this backdrop we pray for Peace in our time.
